#### CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

#### 1.1 Annual General Meeting

#### 1.2 RNHRD Staff and Service Relocations

The Trust extended a warm welcome to colleagues from the RNHRD who have joined us at the RUH's Combe Park site in recent weeks. A number of services have completed their relocation from the Mineral Water Hospital site to the new RNHRD and Brownsword Therapies Centre including Rheumatology, Rheumatology Therapies, Complex Regional Pain Syndrome and Bath Centre for Fatigue Services. The RUH Therapies and Pain services have also relocated to join colleagues in the new centre. Diagnostic services from the RNHRD have relocated to the RUH's Clinical Imaging and Measurement Department. Planning continues for the final phase of service relocations in November 2019. ### 1.3 RUH Supports Organ Donation Week

As part of national Organ Donation Week on 2<sup>nd</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> September 2019 the Trust lent its support to the national 'Pass it on' campaign. The campaign aims to encourage more patients and families to talk about organ donation – and to increase the number of lives that can be saved or transformed by an organ transplant. Five families at the hospital

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consented to organ donation or respecting the wishes of their loved one in 2018/19, which led to at least 17 people receiving life-changing organ transplants. Many more received life-enhancing transplants through tissue donation, such as corneal and heart valve transplants. Next year, the law around organ donation is changing in England. From spring 2020, all adults in England will be considered as having agreed to donate their own organs when they die unless they record a decision not to donate or are in one of the excluded groups. Families will continue to be consulted before organ donation goes ahead.

#### 1.4 Radiology Department Investment Programme

Work has begun to upgrade and replace three scanners at the Trust - the final stage of a development project that will make the hospital's Radiology Department one of the most modern and best-equipped in the South West.

Two older MRI scanners – used to examine most parts of the body, including bones and joints – are being stripped back to their powerful magnet and rebuilt on site with the latest scanning technology. Each scan room that houses them is being refurbished which includes replacing the Radiofrequency cage which lines the room and a complete refit of their control areas. One CT scanner – which can produce detailed images of the inside of the body, including organs, blood vessels and bones – is being removed and replaced with the latest model. Its scanning room and control area are also being refurbished. The work, which is currently taking place and will continue until February 2020, is the final part of a five-year, £7.5m investment programme.

#### 1.5 Hospital Kitchens Investment

A £100k investment in the Trust's kitchens has seen the hospital slash its energy and water use while reducing food waste. The latest in cooking technology has seen five new cookers replace the seven old, outdated boiling pans. The new computer-controlled Vario Cooking Centres (VCCs) are electronically-driven and have individual heating squares which only heat the areas of the cooker that are needed, keeping energy use down. Chefs are also able to programme the cookers for each meal they are making, so that the temperature stays consistent for each dish. Food is now cooked quicker and with perfect timing, so there is less waste. As a result, the RUH is now buying 10% less meat each year, without reducing the amount of meat used in its dishes.

#### 1.6 #EndPJparalysis Global Summit

Several staff at the Trust championed our #EndPJparalysis work at the online global summit on 10<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> July 2019, joining other healthcare professionals from across the world. The summit celebrated Combe ward's dayroom to doorstep project, the brainchild of Senior Sister Helen Slocombe, with support from Occupational Therapist Annabel Hafner, bringing a once underused dayroom back to life for patients to benefit from games, art and rehabilitation. Also speaking at the conference, was Team Lead Occupational Therapist, Nicola Stirling, who talked about "Spreading the End PJ Paralysis love" message throughout the RUH. #### 1.7 NHS Rainbow Badges

Staff at the Trust will start wearing NHS rainbow badges from 17<sup>th</sup> September 2019 to show their support for LGBT+ patients, colleagues and visitors. The NHS rainbow badge project is a way of demonstrating that the RUH is an open, non-judgemental and inclusive environment for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people. It is a way of signalling that people can feel confident in discussing LGBT+ issues with staff, and will be signposted to the appropriate support if needed.

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The launch has been planned by the hospital's LGBT+ staff network – a forum for staff, including allies, to talk about diversity issues and promote inclusion. The badges originated at Evelina London Children's Hospital and are now being adopted at hospitals across the UK.

# 1.8 Visit from Wiltshire Council Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Public Protection

Councillor Laura Mayes, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Public Protection at Wiltshire Council visited the Trust on 4<sup>th</sup> September 2019 to meet with the Chief Executive. As part of the visit Councillor Mayes met with social workers, in reach teams and nurses from BANES, Wiltshire and Somerset who make up the Integrated Discharge Service looking at how staff provide a complex hospital discharge planning service by working to present any delays in transfer and to reduce the length of a patient's stay. Councillor Mayes also visited Combe ward on the Older People's Unit and the new RNHRD and Brownsword Therapies Centre.

### 1.9 RUH Membership

We are always actively seeking new members to help us shape the future of the hospital and as a member of the Trust; you can influence many aspects of the healthcare we provide.

By becoming a Member, our staff, patients and local community are given the opportunity to influence how the hospital is run and the services that it provides. Membership is completely free and offers three different levels of involvement. Through the Council of Governors, Members are given a greater say in the development of the hospital and can have a direct influence in the development of services.

## 1.10 Caring for You

Our next Caring for You event will focus on resuscitation and you can participate in a hands-on CPR session in support of the European "Restart a Heart" initiative. During this special evening, you will learn more about the resuscitation services at the RUH and also gain some skills in CPR for yourself. You will be well looked after whilst being given the opportunity to get hands-on with CPR on manikins and meet the Resuscitation and Simulation Clinical team.
